Survey Results

In the fall of last year we sent out surveys to all SCCC members. To date a little over 30 have returned the surveys

and the following is a summary of the results.

In the category of favorite contests and operating modes, the contest of choice was clearly CQ Worldwide CW by an overwhelming margin. Tied for second were CQ Worldwide Phone, Sweepstakes both modes, and the California QSO Party. For as much club Sprint and NA QSO Party activity as we have, I was surprised to see they ranked so low on the list. The mode of choice, which comes as no surprise, was CW with 11 votes: 4 went to Phone with the remaining 15 indicating that they enjoyed both modes. Onle 2 members indicated that they seriously persue VHF/UHF contesting.

Nearly all (27) indicated they owned IBM PC compatible computer systems and I presume use them in some way in their contesting endeavors. As far as VHF packet is concerned, 21 reported having packet capabilities, however the survey didn't

ask how many actually use packet for contesting.

The most important club activities? The most votes went to club meetings either after TRW or barbecues at different members' houses. Club aggregate competition ranked fairly high with a club Field Day effort and a club banquet being the least desirable activities. Virtually everyone indicated an interest or desire to participate in club team competition of one form or another. Most also felt that any member of an SCCC team should be a dues paying member.

Most people felt the size and content of the club bulletin were just about right (keep up the FB job Mark!) (Thanks! -ed). There were some good suggestions for enhancing the quality of the bulletin such as contesting tips and techniques, contesting circuits, and member/station profiles, to name a few. We're looking at some of these ideas, however, they of course require considerable input from the general membership to implement. The items in the bulletin which most people like to see are the club/contest calendar, club roster, and members' scores. The least interesting to most were the Oblast listing and blank log sheets.

As far as club sponsorship of awards and/or club involvement in log checking were concerned, most felt that we

should do neither.

I made no attempt to "analyze" the survey results, just to summarize them. Surveys provide a convenient means to keep up with the interests and wishes of the majority of the membership, so look for future surveys to be prepared. I personally have found them to be helpful in soliciting more ops for our club team competitions. We have amassed a very good record in the NAQP, Sprint, and CQWW contests in the club competition area and I look forward to the SCCC becoming an even more prominent force to be reckoned with! All that aside, I hope to hear most of you in the CQWW and SS contests coming up, and be thinking about the January NAQPs and February Sprints...73 es GL in the Test.

RSVPs include SCCC gunsfor-hire N6ND, K6JYO, NI6W, NN6U, W6UQF, plus DX Engineering prez N0XX, W7IL, V73AT, F1JTL, and others) If conditions are above average (and, unlike last year, there are no blizzards or power outages), I think we can break W7XR's west coast multi-mutli record (about 12.7 million points, as I recall). I am still putting together teams for the CQWW CW, ARRL 160m, ARRL 10m, both CQ 160m weekends and both ARRL DX weekends. Please get in touch if interested.

This morning I worked VU7CVP, which, when I receive the QSL card, should put me on the Mixed DXCC Honor Roll (achieved without net or list OSOs; I have made less than 5 net or list contacts in the 41 months I have been licensed and no longer count these sham contacts in my country totals). I wonder if this is because (a) it's normal for DXers to turn to contesting for a new ham radio challenge once they've "worked 'em all ," or (b) the proliferation of DX nets has so debased the Mixed and Phone DXCC awards they've become empty accomplishments, sort of like getting an certificate for placing telephone calls to 100 countries??? (I still get a kick from working new CW DXCC countries, however, and need about 15 more to make the CW DXCC Honor Roll.)
