### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In the meantime, if anyone is interested in becoming the San Diego AC, please contact me. AC's are assistants to the President and help organize contest efforts in their areas as well as solicit new members (and help with renewals), coordinate car pools to meetings, etc. etc.

A lot of discussion about the amount of dues has taken place in recent months and finally, at the December 3 meeting in Encino, the discussion came to a head.

Back in late 1982, a proposal was made to the membership to increase the dues from two to seven dollars per year. The additional funds would be used primarily to sponsor contest awards and help sponsor the contest suite at the Visalia DX Convention. There would be other occasional uses also as they arose.

The vote was nearly unanimous with about one third of the membership responding to the mail ballots. The dues increase was therefore put through in early 1983.

Up until that point, membership had been steadily increasing. Suddenly, after the increase, renewals dropped to nearly zero and there were few new members joining.

So the club treasury failed to grow as planned and the membership was dwindling.

It was decided at the December 3 meeting that the dues should be rolled back to two dollars again and a separate fund should be established from donations to sponsor contest awards. The thinking behind this being that currently the major interest of the club is to operate in contests and enter club scores. So be it! Effective immediately, this is the new status of the club.

Those members that stuck with us in 1983 and paid their seven dollars will have their memberships extended as if the dues had been two dollars all along. We greatly appreciate those members' support in 1983.

This bulletin is being sent to former members as well as current ones to inform them that the dues is once again two dollars. Hopefully, most will rejoin us and add their contest scores and skills to ours. Many have already done so!

# UNJAMMING TAILTWISTERS by K1GQ reprinted from NCJ Vol 9 Issue 5


Has your Tailtwister ever refused to turn the antenna? If so, you are in good company. Based on my experience with three different rotators, and that of others as well, I've concluded that sometimes the solenoid is unable to retract the brake wedge. Usually if I flip the motor switch one way or the other, the wedge breaks free. The factory confirms that the Tailtwister brake wedge is shaped differently for more strength and can jam when preloaded. Turning the motor relieves the preload.

This may not work if the rotator is at one of the limits, because the switches inside the rotator prevent turning further into the limit. DON'T CLIMB THE TOWER YET! You can bypass the switches by jumpering terminals at the back of the control box, 5 to 8 for clockwise and 4 to 6 for

counterclockwise.

## W3LPL RECEIVING BANDPASS FILTERS by K3ND reprinted from the NCJ Vol 9 Issue 5

One of the most difficult and important problems to overcome when building a multi-multi is inter-station interference. All too often harmonic and spurious garbage clutter up the front-ends of even the best receivers. The following circuit is a simple and inexpensive solution.



Capacitors are dipped mica.

#### Performance characteristics:


Insertion Loss: Less than 1 dB.

Attenuation: 160-15 meter filters: 70 dB rejection of all other bands. 10 meter filter: 50 dB rejection of all other bands.

Bandwidth: Plus or minus five percent of center frequency.

### Construction

Small aluminum minibox 2 3/4 x 2 1/8 x 1 5/8 inches--no other shielding is required. Phono jacks are placed on each end for input and output. Suggested PC board and parts placement is illustrated below.



Tuning Procedure

Use a calibrated signal generator and RF voltmeter or use a spectrum analyzer and sweep generator. Tune by spreading turns on toroids until bandpass characteristic is centered in the middle of the subject amateur band. In some cases you may have to add or remove some turns for proper performance.

In actual operation these filters have made the difference between hearing and not. For multi-single installations you may desire enclosing several units together in a larger box with a rotary switch for band changing.
