President's Corner February 1990

I'm sitting here trying to think of something profound to say for the first bulletin since the "election", and all that comes to mind is --- I only have 12 more of these to write! I appreciate the support expressed by the club members (most of who are probably glad they didn't get nominated!) and promise to carry out the job as president to the best of my ability. So consider this note the State of the Club address.

This is not your average club. It's not even your average ham radio club! There are a lot of things that make it different. For example, our finances and assets are practically nil, we meet every 2 months (whether we need it or not), and we abolished the board of directors in the last election! Not that these are bad - we don't have to argue on how many T-bills to buy, we can fit contests in between the meetings, and we don't worry too much about Robert's Rules Of Order!

In addition, everyone has their own cadre of contests they operate. Some are partial to domestics - SS, QSO parties, and the like, while some work the DX contests. Some are strictly single-op, while others operate Field Day with the local club. Some unpack and turn on the radio only for the CQWW CW, while others make some Q's in every contest every weekend. Some expend kilo-bucks on the home station to crack the East Coast Curtain (ECC), while others guest-op at exotic DX locations to indulge in their own version of global warfare. We have your CW ops and your SSB ops, VHF'ers and HF'ers, big guns with world records and little guns with local records. (as in "I personally hold all contest records on my street...").

With all this diversity, one might think there is no glue to hold this club together, when in fact one couldn't be further from the truth. The common thread we all share is the rush of competition - competing with yourself, your buddies, the section, the country, or the best in the world. Simply put, this club exists to give us an excuse to get together over lunch and talk contests. Nothing more, nothing less. I don't have any gradiose ideas of growing a "super club" like the PVRC and FRC of the 70's. I would rather see the club continue as magnet to contesters, especially to new hams who want to rub shoulders with some of the "pros". There is a ton of contesting expertise in the club roster. With the contesting ranks decreasing a little bit each year (see Jan/Feb '90 issue of NCJ), it would be a mistake for us not to encourage new contesters. Many of us got our first taste of real contesting when invited to participate in a multi-single or multi-multi operation (even if it was the 160 meter daytime position...). Perhaps it's time to return the favor. Peruse the excellent ideas by Mark WA6OTU in this bulletin for starters.

The next club meeting is February 24th at 11 AM at the Pizza Hut (5107 W. El Segundo Blvd, Hawthorne (213) 676-7435) after the TRW swapmeet. The date is between the ARRL DX CW and SSB weekends, so I'm sure there will be plenty of stories to tell. 73 de NC6U.

NOVICES AND CONTESTS - FINDING THE GOOD EGGS

Recently I was going through the Callbook to get the addresses of about 370 of the most active contest operators I could extract from my logs over the last three years. I was doing a mailing for the Caltech Quickie CW contest we sponsored at W6UE. Chances are if you were active in the Sprint of SS in the last three years, you got one. The amazing thing to me was that out of 370 guys, 17 of them were not Extra Class Licensees.

I was amazed. It drove home the fact we're all reluctant to admit to ourselves - let's face it, Contest operators are the cream of the crop, period. I got to thinking about the implications, and realized it logically followed that Novices who operate contests are the ones with the most potential to become hard-core 'real' hams like us. In this day and age of shrinking amateur ranks and doomsday sayers predicting the demise of our hobby we have a relatively easy way of sorting the wheat from the chaff, as it were.

We are also, each one of us, faced with the responsibility of doing something about our less than ideal status quo. As the saying goes, "everyone must do their part". Some of us take this more seriously than others, and here again, as the top guys in our hobby, I think we are just a bit obligated to lead the way helping our best newly-licensed prospects on their way to a truly rewarding lifetime hobby.

Tree, N6TR, David, AA6RX, and myself sat down about a week ago to discuss this. We concluded that as a club it would be very easy for us to make a difference to the new guys who show some potential. First of all, we have to sort them out of the background somehow. Everyone has their own best way to do this - be it a Novice who comes back to your CQ on 7115 at 18 WPM, or a guy with a KA6 callsign who has figured out how to run them at over 100 an hour during the 10 Meter contest while keeping a dupesheet - the symptoms are obvious. Here are more ideas:

1) Hold contests for Novices (like I attempted to do under the SCCC banner in January, but got tripped up because the League didn't print my announcement). 2) Establish a rule in the Sweepstakes wher it is to our advantage to make several QSO's with Novices. 3) Offer a special award for seasoned ops who put out the time and effort to get a Novice who hasn't done it beofre on the air for a contest. 4) Set up Novice sub-categories in FD, SS, etc. so they're actually competing for some kind of award.

Our ultimate goal as a club would at this point be to track and encourage the really good Novices to persue the game by acknowledging their abilities and inviting them to upgrade and join the big operations. It may seem like putting the cart before the hourse a bit, but these are the same guys who are going to pass the most accurrate traffic at the highest rates when the 'big one' hits. And we owe it to ourselves to do what we can to keep these ops from falling out of the Amateur Radio Service.

The SCCC has a chance to really do a good job in this worthwhile endeavor, but it's going to take some hours and some correspondence. Over the next few months, we'll be looking for some volunteers. I hope we won't let ourselves down.

Ray did state that "Sprint contests are like trying to junp on a moving train you either catch it right away and take off like a rocket or keep trying to grab a handle."





Fig 3—John Swancara's RS-232-C-to-keying-line interface consists of just four parts. You can build the circuit on a piece of scrap copper-ciad circuit board. John obtained U1, a TIL-111 optocoupler, as part of Radio Shack's 276-139 optocoupler assortment.


