OAHU REPORT ... de N6VI/KH6

In February I had the pleasure of a visit from vacationing Fred, K9VV, and Lisa. Clara, meanwhile, was on the mainland and got to visit with Karen Walker, N6ZZ's YL. We both enjoyed the company.

Those island expeditioners among you might be interested in a map store I found in Honolulu; they carry detailed maps of the Pacific that you might be hard pressed to find elsewhere. Their stock comes from the U.S. Geological Survey, the FAA, National Geographic and the Defense Mapping Agency, among other sources. If you need, say, a 64,000:1 topographic map of Suva, they probably have it or can get it. Hawaii's Geographic Society Publications can be reached at 808 538-3952. They're very helpful and knowledgeable.

In the last issue I said I would show the physical layout of the property, towers and existing antennas, so here we go. As you will see on the accompanying diagram, we are on a long (720') and narrow (120') lot. Five ninety-foot towers stand about 140 feet apart in a line from west (#1) to east (#5), and a sixth is placed nearer the north side of the lot. They are presently decorated as follows (existing antennas are Telrex and towers are guyed Rohn 45):

guyed Ronn 45)

#1 - 8-el 15M rotating over 8-el 15M fixed (U.S.), in phase

#2 - 2-el 75M rotating (at least it's supposed to rotate)

#3 - 8-el 15M rotating over 5-el 15M fixed (ZL), separately fed #4 - 10-el 10M rotating over 6-el 10M fixed (JA), phased or split

#5 - empty; originally held the 2-el 75M and later a 3-el 40M

#6 - empty; originally held a 5-el or 6-el 20M antenna

The old 20M and 40M beams are in antenna heaven somewhere (maybe on Kauai, the way the wind can blow here), but I have replacements from DX Engineering in boxes waiting to be built and installed. There is also an elongated diamond loop for 160M stretched between towers #1 and #3, and the remnants of an inverted vee or two are hanging about.


Tower #5 is the highest, thanks to an upslope of nearly 60 feet from the front of the property to the back, and it overlooks a 200' gulch from about 80 through 160 degrees. That subjects it to the greatest wind gusts (which is why the 75M had to be relocated to tower #2) and also poses a strategy question. Both 40M and 75M spent some time on #5 and #2; according to Randy, both performed better on #5. The height advantage on 40M meant being very loud rather than just loud, but the advantage on 75M meant getting into Europe versus not. So where do we put the 40? My gut says put it on tower #5 because A) you can never be too loud on 40M, B) the condition of the 75M aluminum after 10 years might have degraded, C) the 75M weighs 300 pounds and is a bitch to move, and D) there may be effective, practical alternatives to that band (none of the towers are that high if you're a 75M yagi).

The triangular orientation of towers #4, #5 and #6 may lend itself to some interesting switched-direction vertical or loop arrays. I once put up phased delta loops on 75M at my Sepulveda QTH, and in the 8 days before it blew down I worked eight new European countries on the band to finish up 5BDXCC. I have no experience with verticals or arrays thereof, so wisdom from you, dear readers, is welcomed. In any case, nothing's

going up before the guys are replaced.

I recently bought a John Deere riding mower to help keep the constantly growing grass under control and cruising on the green machine in the shadow of all that hardware may provide me with some inspiration regarding the foregoing matters. The computer, however, must pass judgment on any such flights of fancy before I use up valuable family time dangling from a safety belt and pulling ropes.

Unless things take a surprise turn for the better, work will again preclude my attendance at Visalia. We'll miss seeing you all, but have fun! 73, Marty, N6VI


