## Message from the Prez

Hello all. Nice to see many of you in Visalia and Dayton again this year. I had the pleasure of finally associating a face with a voice/fist while cruising around the Visalia Holiday Inn this year. We had around 40 people attend our Saturday lunch meeting this year. The SCCC was again well represented at the convention and several programs presented by our more nomadic members. Our next meeting is coming up soon. We typically have meetings in Jun, Aug etc however, with Field Day and July 4th weekends coming up soon, we elected to go with a early July meeting this time around. Our August meeting will be held in conjunction with the annual SCDXC, SDDXC Summer Bash which will be at the QTH of Rick, WB60KK in Placentia this year.

Dayton turned out to be a bust this year; at least if you were at all interested in the swap meet portion of it. It rained for virtually all of the Hamvention. I stayed at the Stouffers this year for the first time. If you are contemplating going to the Hamvention in the future I would recommend staying there. There were several good presentations made again this year at the Antenna and Contest Forums. Since there are many of using, or contemplating using, two radios I thought I would share a concept with you here. The ideal situation would of course be to have two radios/amps and

plenty of antennas to choose from. But what happens when you want to run two radios and can only put up a single tower with a tribander and shorty forty? Eric Scace, K3NA did a presentation showing how one could use a tribander on any two bands at the same time. He had proposed using a network of coaxial stub filters and coax matching sections to build a triplexer. Has this been done successfully before? You could probably expand the concept to add another port for 40M for those people with Pro 96's etc. I found this idea to be very intriguing. I don't think he actually built and tested a complete coaxial triplexer so I'm not sure what kind of problems to expect. I am hoping to drag out some excess coax pieces, tee connectors and a network analyzer soon and try to build one of these things and make it work. If I am successful in doing so I will publish the results for those who may be interested in something like this. One drawback to a two radio - single antenna system is the inability to point in multiple directions at one time. I think the improvement over a single radio/antenna would still be substantial if done correctly.

Just a quick note regarding this years Sweepstakes Contest. As most of you probably know by now the SCCC won the ARRL Medium Club Competition this year! Not only that but our score was better than all but one in the Unlimited Category...the NCCC. Congrats to all of you and lets do it again this year. Larry, N6AZE is already hard at work organizing this years SCCC effort. Also, a potential SCCC-NCCC perpetual Competition is being considered with the details being worked out now. #### FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT

CQ-CONTEST is a computer bulletin board where everyone who "subscribes" is sent all notes (email) posted on (sent to) the board. It is better than 3830 for contest results. Many top scores are posted with complete band or even hour by hour summaries. It can be like receiving a mini CQ, QST and NCJ combined on almost a daily basis. Have a technical question? You can get expert answers in a day. Recent threads (topics) have included stacking yagis, tips on using slingshots for putting up antennas coincidentally came up two days after I got a slingshot with a fishing reel mounted on the wrist support,) the causes and effects of coronal holes on propagation, plus items on rotors, modifying yagis and transceivers and numerous other topics that you don't even know you are interested in until you read about them.

Want to get in on the vanity callsign program? If you subscribe to CQ-CONTEST you heard about it before most. You could download a file of all available 1X2 calls. Want to propose contest rule changes? Most of the CAC subscribes to CQ-CONTEST.

CQ-CONTEST also has its own, on-the-air, contest, the sprINT. This is a two hour sprint (20 & 40 meters, 150 watts maximum power) with a few twists. The twists are you send the name you were sent in the last QSO (you use your own name for #1) and you can

work dupes as long as you work 3 other stations between "dupes." So there is no lack of stations to work. One of the best parts of this contest is that logs must be submitted electronically (within 72 hours) and each submission's accuracy is reported (about 10 days later) in amazing detail. The next sprINT is set for July 23

N6TR contest software users. You might also be interested in more traditional bulletin boards (not reflectors) for other ham (and non-ham) interests. These are usually referred to as newsgroups. Some are pretty esoteric (there is a newsgroup for Firesign Theatre fans.)

You may be able to get on CQ-CONTEST for free if your place of business has Internet access. It is also available free via many educational institutions. My access costs \$23 a month via Delphi. Recently other commercial vendors have instituted less costly programs. If you have questions or would like to see a typical day's email, give me a call. 73,
