

Randy and Dave will retain sole editorship, and assured me that they have no intention of white-washing any ARRE criticism from the pages of our Contest Journal. What happens after 18 months is kind of up in the air, but one thing is for sure. At least there will still be an NCJ at the end of it, which is a good thing.

CONTEST ADVISORY COMMITTEE NEWS

About the only disappointment in connection with the Visalia convention this year was the relative scarcity of wildflowers to view during the drive home. Everything else was great, including seeing so many friends from near and far. As is customary, my sleep was limited to about three hours a night so as not to miss the chance to talk with as many fellow competitors as possible.

While at the convention, an idle comment to WZ6Z about wishing I could replace the power supply in my TS-930 with a switching supply resulted in my getting information from N6BT on the topic. The idea is to cut the rig's weight (7 lbs or better is possible) and reduce chassis/cabinet heating and thus cooling requirements. If you have data to share or would be interested in getting together on a quantity design / order, let me know.

The current hot topic before the CAC is Section Sweepstakes once again. The issue is whether to permit QSO's on each band with any given station to count separately. Arguments in favor include the faster pace that would result, especially in the final hours of the contest, and the added complexity of decision-making which would place a premium on operator skill (main proponent: W2GD). Arguments against are several, in my mind: the big guns working each other on six bands would squeeze out the smaller stations which are now sought out, especially near the end of the contest; antennas for six bands would be needed to be competitive, leaving out the op who doesn't have room for 160 meters; op's would no longer be required to slow down and work novices or other noncontesting passers-by and would not adopt the friendly, pleading, cajoling manner which brings non-contesters out of the woodwork; and comparability of scores between years would be temporarily destroyed. WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS? I would like some input before I respond to the suggestion.

On a personal note, I am happy to tell you that I will have moved into my new QTH by the time you read this. The new address is: 17780 Ridgeway Road, Granada Hills, CA 91344. The new telephone number, at least temporarily, is 818-360-1756 (I'm waiting for a particular number to become available in June). We're about seven miles northwest of the Tupper St. location, north of Rinaldi off Zelzah. In a few months we should be in a position to host a pool-and barbecue meeting; stay tuned. I'm sad that no hams have expressed an interest in the old QTH with its stacked array and loo' tower, so it will probably come down by June. Anyone with an interest in a specific antenna or other component should get in touch with me.

I'd like to take a moment to thank Ski N6ADI for his ongoing efforts on SCCCORE and on other coordination activities for the club. I encourage you to send him items of interest, opinions, observations, etc. for use in the bulletin.





THE FIRST EVER NEGI M/S EFFORT by NE6I Dennis Younker

One late evening on 2mtrs, Marty WEAKS, Tracy KB6ATI, and I were talking contest talk and I mentioned it might be fun to put all the Antelope Valley area hams who either are contesters or interested in contesting in a M/S effort in WPX SSB. Marty and Tracy thought it would be a great idea and the rest of the evening and following week were spent planning.

The main thrust of the effort was to provide contest experience and a learning environment as well as a chance to

operate at an above average station.

Things really got into gear the week before the contest when Keith K6GXO gave us the green light to use his superb station on one of the foothills south of Palmdale. The station has a clear shot in all directions, sitting well above the desert floor. Boasting 4 elem monos on 40, 20, & 15; delta loops on 80/75; and an inverted L on 160. We put up a 40 mtr inverted vee and 3 elem tribander for spotting and use on 10mtrs (should it open).

We assembled a team of operators, all necessary equipment for operating and spotting and keeping with the "learning experience" theme agreed to give real time computer

logging/duping a try.

Skip Taylor, a local IBM WHIZ, agreed to write a custom program to our specifications. Considering Skip is not yet a ham and had limited interaction with me about our needs, he did a bangup job! We did find a few flaws that we plan to correct in the future. Skip is also planning to perhaps make this IBM compatible program menu driven so it can be set up for any contest! When complete, he plans to make it available as "FREEWARE"! Let me tell you, this program is very easy to use, and works GREAT! Even with over 1000 QSO's in it, it checked calls as input for dupes virtually instantly, looged the NSO in the main log and the "band Log", checked to see if it was a mult and if so, added it to a mult file, all faster than you can blink an eye! It saves to the hard drive every few MSO's minimizing any chance to lose your log!

Friday, I took off work early and started to assemble the station. Tracy set up the computer, and Skip finished up the program (with less than 10 minutes to go before the contest!). Marty sat down and got ready to start the contest at 0000Z. In the last minute excitement, I forgot how to tune up Keith's station, costing us the first 20 minutes. After Keith re-trained us, Marty took off operating. We immediately found the first flaw in the contest program, but ouickly found a work-around. Marty settled in on 20, working mostly JA's. I finished assembling the spotting station and checked up on some

of the other operators scheduled to show.

Everything was going smoothly until a few hours later, when it was time to relieve Marty at the mic. I sat down to take over, but this simple action was enough to make the computer keyboard revolt and the "5" key stopped working! I worked a couple texans and had input them in the log before I even noticed! In our frustration, we failed to notice the keyboard had a numerical pad on the right side where we could input the number "5": A call to Tracy on 2 mtrs provided that little piece of info (embarrassing us) and he suggested we use contact cleaner on the bad key.

40 mtrs was lousy early in the evening, so we spent some time on 80 working the Carribeans and South Americans as well as picking up some stateside mults. Our other operators began arriving and took turns at the helm. My next screwup came at 08452. I was keeping tabs on the time so I could wake up Marty who was doing the prayeyard shift starting at 20m land

there was no clock in local time handy, and I managed to decided 0900Z was 2am local. (It is when we are in Daylight Savings Time, but we weren't yet!) So, at 0845Z, I woke up a sleepy Marty, and a few minutes later he sat down to take over, still half asleep (or maybe MORE). I headed home to catch some sleep, and when I layed down in bed, I glanced at the clock. It said 1:45am. What? I got up to lock at my GMT clock and it read 0945Z. Oh no, I had woke Marty up an hour early! Nothing I could do now though. A quick listen on 40 to check on him. He was still asleep...and operating! Someone else in our group listening to him late at night from hore commented the next day that Marty failed to give the listening frequency on 40 for quite a long stretch and didn't work anyone then either. It's OK, Marty, you can't be expected to remember everything on only 3 hours sleep! But he did work several hundred that night anyway!

Things went smoothly Saturday morning. Tom AB6Z showed early and spotted many valuable mults. Tracy relieved Marty allowing him to go back to sleep! I took over the mic sometime in the afternoon, and promptly had the amplifier's TR relay start acting up, reducing our receive "ears" by 30+ DB! I had to give up and open the amp to fix it, losing half an hour. However, the station was out to prove it didn't like me that weekend, and it wasn't long before the mic's PTT quit working. I switched to VOX and started opening the base of the mic while still operating. I found a wire had broken inside the MC-50. Hmmm....how does that happen, and why now? Keith and his XYL had gone to LA for the day, and we couldn't find a soldering iron. We were too preoccupied with everything and didn't think to call on of the locals on 2 mtrs to get a gun brought up, so

we stuck with VOX.

Well, Keith has this bird in the shack over near the window. This bird gets real excited whenever someone comes into view out the window and he starts chirping, LOUDLY! If you heard us that afternoon, "CQ CONTEST (CHIRP), CQ CONTEST (CHIRP, CHIRP) NORWAY ECHO (CHIRP) SIX INDIA (CHIRP, CHIRP, CHIRP)" then you now realize someone was outside the shack

window goofing around.

Somewhere around 2330Z, Dan WD680I discovered that 15 had finally opened to JA and I instructed Tracy to OSY. The band was quiet and we didn't hear many stations, but the few JA's we heard were quite strong. Tracy picked out a clear spot and called CQ. That single CQ attracted the largest pile-up I have ever heard on my callsign! Tracy had never experienced a solid JA run before and went HOG WILD! He logged 103 QSO's in 55 minutes! The JA's seemed to all be the same signal strength and it was difficult to get any calls out of the pile. I taught him to wait long enough to get at least two letters of a callsign from the pile and then answer with those two letters. Instead of him saying "QRZ the Radio Golf", I showed him how to nearly double the rate by simply saying "Radio Golf 59 %. The JA would respond with report and full call. It worked flawlessly, especially since the JA's are so well behaved.

When Keith returned he got the mic fixed. All the chatter on the local repeater got some of the locals interested in contesting. Several asked to be included in our next M/S

effort! CREAT! More new contesters!!

We bounced between 40 & 80 Saturday nite. I was scheduled to do the graveyard and Rick NeGTS decided to stay too! Rick had never contested seriously before this and since 40 hadn't opened to JA, I put him on the mic (this prevented me from breaking the rig, something I was getting good at!). Rick had fun operating 40 & 80, but 160 provided nothing.

Finally 40 opened to JA and since Rick was having so much fun and this was supposed to be a training effort, I elected to let him keep operating. A little schooling on running JA's and off he went. Rick tired about 3am, so I took over. Our strategy for Saturday night was to concentrate on °O once it opened to JA. So I did, once it did, and our OSO rate began to take off again. I worked them faster than Rick could log (half asleep) so I logged on paper and Rick irput from my sheet into the computer. Since we were no longer real time duping, we wound up logging a lot of dupes during that stretch. It didn't take too long for the rig to figure out who was operating and revolt again! This time the amp began arcing internally on voice peaks. So I backed off on the audio a bit to prevent it. soon it started up again, so I backed off more. It became a see-saw battle, me against the rig!

After a while, I told Rick we were going to have to stoo pretty soon and open the amp and figure out the problem. Well, before we did, we heard a loud pop and smelled the infamous scent of burnt components. NOW it was time to stop. Surprisingly, we couldn't find anything wrond inside. So we took our lives in our hands and defeated the amp's safety's so we could transmitt with the cover off. we still couldn't see the ARC (we were running 300 watts out at this point) so we cranked up the power. Voila! We spotted a strange looking capacitor across the plate choke that was arcing and had both a hole in it and lots of "charcoal" on it. We elected not to run the amp anymore and lost two hours getting another one to the station. We couldn't seem to work anything barefoot, and managed all of two Q's during that time.

Once back on full power, Bob W9NQ went to 20 and plunged into a long solid opening to Europe. He, with Chuck WAGR logging at the computer, added many many valuable European mults. Dan WD680I watched for opening on 15 & 10 and spotted mults on 20. I stayed off the rig Sunday and (little wonder) the thing performed without any further incidents!

10 meters never did open for us that weekend, and 15 provided a minimal number of QSO's Sunday. 20 stayed hot for

us all day.

Everyone participating in our effort had a ball and gained valuable experience in contesting. All are eager for another M/S effort and now have the confest bug thoroughly in their blood! Most will no doubt be heard more and more in future contests.

The group surpassed our goal of 1000 QSO's and we achieved our goal fo getting the locals more interested and serious about contesting!

Our rough score is 1475 QSO's by 510 mults for an estimated 1.8 million points! CREAT JOB GUYS!!!

Dear Ski:

I just got off the phone with Bruce Clark K6JYO. He said you needed details on the Hughes-Fullerton Field Day plans to put in the SCCC next bulletin. Here goes:

Goals: Break into the top three for class 3A (Last year, K6QEH was =5 in class 3A, and the only cl b West of Dallas in the top 20.) Train people to be good contest operators. Eat good and have fun.

Where: Simpson Park, located hehind the Hughes Aircraft Co. Sunny Hills facility (see attached map). From 91 Pwy or 5 Pwy, get off at Beach and go North to Malvern. Right (East) on Malvern to Gilbert. Left (North) on Gilbert to 2nd light ("East-West" Road, on Hughes property). Right on "East-West road to stop sign. Left at stop sign, follow the winding road around the bend into the park. The Field Day site will be based in the main pavillion, the softball field, and the upper field as indicated in the map. Talk-in on the Hughes-Fullerton repeater on 146.97/146.37.

When: We will begin setup Friday afternoon (June 26) just after lunch. We will assemble beams, set up tents, string power cables, and put up and test the antennas before 8 PM Friday night. The park will be locked and patrolled that night, so the antennas will stay up CK. Saturday morning (June 27), the park will open at 7 AM, and we will assemble and test all stations by 10 AM. The contest starts at 11 AM and runs through Sunday until 11 AM. Take down will take approximately 2 hours, and we should be out by 1 or 2 PM.

Facilities: Simpson Park has hot and cold running water, showers, bathrooms, actual green grass (not the XE2SI variety of ground covering'), lockers, a microwave ('), basketball court, and an idemaker. No alcoholic beverage, except beer in cans (no bottles). No pets, no motorbikes, etc.... the usual stuff! Non-Hughes employees are guests of the Hughes club, and must obey "the rules". (We shouldn't have too much of a problem here -- after all, this is a serious contest!) The site has a clear shot in all directions, is fairly high up in the Sunny Hills area, and is pretty radio-quiet.

Antennas: This is the good part! There are four 70' wooden lighting poles around the pavillion area, 90' apart, with maintainance pulleys near the top. We simply tie a beam to the rope and pull it up to about 55' - no sweat! The antennas are guyed at the ends and usually left pointing toward W3-land, but they can be set up with an Armstrong rotor without too much trouble. There will be four stations in the pavillion and one out in the upper field. HF Station #1 will have a 2 element 40m yagi (KLM), a 5 element 20m yagi, and an 80m delta loop. The Novice Station will have a CL-33 tribander for 10 and 15, and access to the 40 and 80 meter antennas from Station #1 when they aren't being used. The VHF/Packet station will have an Isopole and an 11 element yagi for 2m, and a 13 element yagi for 220 MHz. HF Station #2 will have a 4 element 15m yagi, a 4 element 10m yagi, a 4 element 20m yagi, and a 75m delta loop. HF Station #3, out in the field, will have a 3 element 40m Bobtail curtain (aimed at W3), a 40m horizontal loop (for local), and a KT-34 tribander on a small crank-up tower. Since the Novice and Packet stations don't count as class-transmitters, we will be in the 3A catagory.

Stations: We will be using 3 TS-930s, fully loaded, for the three HF stations, an IC-735 for the Novice station, and various and sundry VHF gear with 150W amps. Back-up HF gear will consist of a TS-830, the Novice rig, and any other gear people want to bring. Operators can bring their own keyers, paidles, etc. if desired. Inter-station communications will be via 2m simplex. The stations will be set up on picnic tables under the pavillion, and in a tent in the field.

Power: Power will be supplied by a 3 KW Wisconsin ("Yellow Thunder") and a 4 KW Onan ("Blue Thunder") for the pavillion stations, and a pair of 1500 W MacCulloughs for Station #3 in the upper field.

Strategy: The general operating strategy is as follows: Station #1 concentrates on 20 CW (cay) and 40/80 CW (night), Station #2 covers 20/15/10 SSB (day) and concentrates on 75 SSB (night), and Station #3 covers 40/20/15/10 CW and SSB (day) and 40 SSB (night). We would like to have two HF stations on CW and one on SSB throughout the contest; however, the band/mode scheduling has to be flexible, depending on conditions. The VHF FM station is operated when the rate at one of the 3 HF stations, etc. The Novice station can operate throughout the entire contest on the particular band which causes the least amount of interference to the HF stations. We will make a serious effort to get all the bonus points (except, possibly, the 100 points for message relays). We want to keep the good operators on the hot bands/modes throughout the contest.

Food: Hot food and drink will be provided during the entire operation by Warren N6MWI, including the Friday setup. We will have BBQ steaks Saturday night for dinner, along with potluck veggies, salads, etc. (Last year, we put away 40 lbs of London Broil steak!)

Needs: We could probably use a big tower/trailer for Station #3, a backup 20m yagi for Station #2, and multiple back-up HF rigs, as well as plenty of fresh lungs/fists and strong backs.

Miscellaneous: Plan to sleep on the lawn or in your car/truck/tent if you are staying overnight. Plan to bring about \$10-20 (max) for food. Drop a line to NC6U (621 N Ladera Vista, Fullerton CA, 92631) or call (714-670-4743 W, or 714-870-4849 H) by June 5th and indicate when you can come, and what your operating and eating interests are.


