

YAESU FT-901-DM REVIEW

Not being a person who has kind words to say about transceivers very often, I would like to savour the moment by saying that in my test operation of the Yaesu FT-901, I didn't miss a single contact because of the radio.

The extent of my knowledge of this radio prior to my using one came largely by word of mouth. I had heard that it had adjustable filters on CW capable of out-performing a Drake R-4C with the 600 Hz Sherwood filter installed. I'm sure this is a statement none of us takes lightly, so I got ahold of one to see for myself. I had about two months of once-a-week operation, including one day of the ARRL SSB DX Contest, to familiarize myself with the transceiver before the April CW CD party. I was assured that the radio I was borrowing was up-to-snuff, in fact, the shop checked it out for me just before I took it.

The FT-901 boasts two 600 Hz CW filters, one fixed, the other tunable around the first's passband. The instructions say that you have a controllable width passband because of this feature, but when I tried to see how it worked, it just didn't play. Upon inserting the moveable filter, signals dropped a fair amount, and selectivity didn't seem to improve. In fact, it sounded like the same 600 Hz bandwidth had been retained, and that its skirts had become very mushy. I decided against using this feature in the contest since the fixed filter sounded better by itself.

The rig has an excellent 100 Hz "Audio Passband Filter" who's center frequency is variable throughout the 600 Hz filter's passband. This filter works very well but is too narrow to use throughout a contest unless everyone calls you within 50 Hz of your frequency, which we know is not the case. It is with this filter activated that Yaesu must be making its claim to out-perform the Drake receiver. In actual operation the Drake is easier to use because you don't need to switch in and center a second filter whenever you hear a weak signal. I have always been able to keep the R-4C 250 Hz filter in all the time. In this case, ease of operation takes a higher vote from me than the ability to filter your passband from 100 Hz to 600 Hz by throwing a switch and turning a tiny knob.

Filtering aside, this transceiver possesses a malady that most other transceivers have, the lack of a reference pitch to tell you where you are transmitting with respect to the receiver. Granted the sidetone is designed to be a close approximation of your CW offset frequency, but when the RIT is engaged, you may as well be driving a car when your're blind. The FT-901 RIT works very well, but unless you switch it out or center it to zero, you have very little idea where your transmitter is with respect to what you are listening to.

As I said in the beginning, this radio didn't cost me any QSO's, and let me make it known that I have always preferred an S-line or a Drake line to operate contests with. I hate RITs and I can't stand not listening to my own signal when I'm sending. All that aside, the last hint I have for using the FT-901 in a contest is to learn how to write while your're sending because you have got too many controls to adjust when you are receiving and you have to log sometime.
